A fire marshal entered the Talkhouse and told the staff to evacuate all the customers due to safety concerns. About 45 minutes later, the power came back on, but the bar shut down, losing a lot of busi-

"I tried to run after the people that I forced into the pouring rain but, for some reason, they had left," joked **Nick Kraus**, the bar's co-owner.

Later in the morning, another blackout caused 1,500 outages on the East End.

The East Hampton Village fire department had to rescue someone trapped inside an elevator at 66 Newtown Lane. Hopefully it wasn't Dick Cavett.
